Matt Hurst recently sent an email to all our members about the forthcoming Marshal training day, explaining the advantages of attending this free course. So far there has been very little interest. If you are interested but cannot make that day, please let Matt know, we may be able to arrange a more convenient date for you.

Volunteering on an occasional basis can be as satisfying as actually taking part. As Matt has said in his email, without additional support we will not be able to run future planned events, so, even if you can only help at one event per year, please let Matt know.

Chat from the Chair...

"It's relentless"

Introduction

Well, that's been (and still is), another busy period, and there was me hoping that things would be calming down – I've put that down to foolish optimism!

We've had another great success at Festival of Wheels although that did come with a cost in terms of post-show fixing and cleaning to be done, together with a thoroughly enjoyable trial held at our Newbourne site.

We are always learning and improving and should continue to do so, adapting and changing where things don't quite work in a particular instance despite having been done that way for many years prior. Certainly, we cannot and shall not become complacent, or set in our ways, and at times we will have to review and change what or how we do things.

Festival of Wheels (FoW)

Just a brief summary here (see further FoW show write up) of another successful show although not without its challenges (I do wish the challenges would stop – it's getting a bit tedious). Saturday being wet, wet, wet and Sunday, well I think mud glorious mud is probably the most accurate phrase.

The challenges (note the plural) that the team had to overcome were exceptional, I can't remember a set of conditions like that since Day 2 of the Suffolk Show was cancelled one particular year (and that I can't remember the date – must be the age creeping in).

Despite the success, there is a lot of learning to come from this event. We were faced with a set-of conditions and challenges that you might say, in weather speak, was a 1/100-year event that seems to happen every 5 or 10 years – we cannot continue on this basis and improvements have to be made.

The idea of shows is that they provide an 'Off-Road Experience', they are not intended to be damaging as the vehicles do get punished although we usually manage to break at least one. This year I would hazard a guess we set a new record for the number of vehicles broken in one way or another at a single event.

RTV / Tyro Trial

Hot on the heels of the FoW finishing was another one of the scheduled trial events, again utilising the what would have normally been a club driving day, still as a bit of an experiment. Tim's briefing said non-scratchy....remind me to look up the dictionary definition. In fact, I have an idea .

This I felt was a great event with 11 entrants from complete beginners right through to the old reprobates (no names mentioned) and complete with guest appearances from members we hadn't seen for a while. It was very close run throughout the day and there may have been just a little family rivalry at times.

It's relentless

As per the title of this article, the effort and work to set-up, turn-up, pack away, sort out afterwards, fix things and deal with any issues arising from these events is quite simply vast. We are entirely grateful to all those that give up significant amounts of time to help with this although we still need more help, we cannot keep this pace up.

Progress

We had hoped that we'd have some certainty in a number of areas but this is still WIP. That said, there is still much we can and continue to do behind the scenes.

One thing for imminent discussion will be that of committee positions. We have some natural changes coming along and it's also time to review the roles and posts we have. These posts have been in place for longer than I've been part of the club and it's probably fair to say are not entirely relevant today. To help with that, Matt & Graham are working on short definitions of the roles & responsibilities. More on this next month.

Land-Rover 75th Year

I mentioned this last month and at the time of writing (14th) have had no input into how you'd like us to recognise this historic milestone. To that end I'll assume you don't have a view or don't particularly care.

Marshal Training

Once again, a marshal training session is being organised and you will have seen a separate communication for this complete with a new initiative, (good idea Graham), to try and entice more of you into the world of Marshalling. It is hoped that this will also entice our existing marshal's, some of which we haven't seen for a while to come out of hiding and magically appear in order to help us run these events – again, it's the same people over and over and this cannot continue.

Stonham Barns

As some of you will be aware we are in early discussions with Stonham Barns re their show on the 8th Oct. This is a new 'dedicated' Land Rover Show and if successful may become a thing. They would like us there and we are in active discussions with them, investigating options for us to provide rides, as we do. There's nothing else tangible I can say here just now but standby for further, separate communications.

Conclusion

As I sit here and write this (item 1 of 3 for nooze this month), at 5.30 in the morning, the rain has just started and I'm feeling battered already. Fortunately, just 2 hellish days this week before another couple of cheeky days off.

Course Detail

We are holding a Marshal Training Course on 2nd September and would invite both members who have been Marshals before (but qualification has lapsed), and members who have never taken the step to learn what it's all about!

The Marshal course covers many aspects of our club operation and also Driving and Safety, including safe Winch use - key topics covered are:

- Roles of the Marshal & Clerk of Course
- Safety inspection of vehicles (scrutineering)
- Recovery equipment and procedures
- Winch operation and safety overview for recoveries
- Driver education Off-road driving techniques

The course covers some great theory items in the form of classroom/presentation work, and then the main bulk of the day is practical - putting into action everything covered in the classroom, including undertaking safe recoveries, and performing some driving on the courses. The course will run from 10:00 to around 15:00, and if you're camping over, you will have the opportunity to use your newly learned skills the following day.

There will be NO charge for this training, and as others can testify from previous courses held, there is a lot of valuable things to learn during the day, so it's well worth while – you're guaranteed to learn something new and useful!

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Festival of Wheels 2023

Well, talk about challenges, and no we didn't complete a twist off challenge.



So last year, the headline for the show write up was "Where do we start......The final event of 2022 started and finished with a bang!" Whilst the headline is correct metaphorically any bang would have been subsided by the amount of water!

With a very iffy looking forecast emphasis was on getting the outside set-up completed in terms of the marquee, see saw and traffic lanes / walkways etc. This was all done with remarkable efficiency, aided by some metal barrier fencing supplied by the organisers. This was a very welcome addition and improvement to the endless reels of orange mesh we usually have to put out.

We're often used to the weather forecasters getting things slightly wrong and whilst we all secretly hoped they would be wrong for this weekend; they were pretty much spot on.

We have a luxury of a bit more space at this event which affords us a camping area directly next to the course and this year a rather nice land rover display in front of that.



Day 1 - It's wet and they're still queuing

With additional rain prevention measures taken (extra gazebo's) for those outside all day (gate / loading & unloading staff) we thought we were fairly well prepared – oh how wrong we were. A light drizzle soon turned into a steadier rain, followed by a heavier rain subsequently followed by monsoon type rain. There was no keeping dry.

Despite the wet, the queue to enter was substantial, snaking around the car park to enter and once those gates opened, we were busy and looking back on last year, the same happened. Where did all these people come from, they just kept coming and coming whilst the rain got heavier and heavier.



The course was getting slippery, must to the delight of some of our drivers although in some cases, too slippery and on more than occasion we had vehicles pointing in the wrong direction. The wet conditions certainly kept those ground staff busy fencing off features that were starting to get a bit too hairy – sorry chaps.



The roar of Steve's V8 certainly attracted attention and for every person that said they wanted a ride in that one, someone else said they didn't.

By early afternoon the course had river like tendencies with water completely filling the tyre tracks and the course resembling a boggy mess. How Craig's white 90 stayed so clean is a mystery – must try harder craig).





3 o'clock came and it was silly, there was no visibility, the rain continuing to increase in velocity and we were getting wetter and wetter. The punters that had braved the show at this point were now scarpering to the exit looking somewhat bedraggled. We closed the doors on a very wet but nethertheless successful day later learning we had completed 151 rides raising £1,844 pre-expenses – that's not bad at all and having not broken anything.......don't speak too soon.





Day 2 - Ah it's OK the wind will soon dry the course out

Again, how misguided, or foolishly optimistic we were. We anticipated Sunday being busier as typically Sunday is 'show' day in the car world, it wasn't raining and everyone that came on the Saturday was allowed to come back on the Sunday (brilliant PR by the organisers).

I arrived on site to my gazebo having been demolished by the wind which turned out to be just the first casualty of the day. Just as preparations were being made to open an uninvited and unwelcome gust of wind gave us a bit of a problem with our marquee that decided it didn't want to be with us anymore. Fortunately, no one was seriously hurt although this is not something any of us want to experience again. That said, within 30 mins the marquee was down and we were back up and running with an improvised shelter (thanks Steve & Katy).



The course was even more slippery than it was on the Saturday and Tim's definition of 'it's perfect', I still find questionable. Getting from one side to the other on foot was interesting to say the least – I never fell over mind, honest. Sunday was full of improvisation and this is also where the breakdowns started. This combined with only a handful of vehicles running was the flavour of the day.

The unloading section had to move so we could try and get customers out onto grass rather than mud, although this move did actually work really well. As for the see saw, even the seasoned veterans were having a battle getting up.





First to go I think was Emma's D2 with an alternator, then Steve's air intake had ingested too much mud and was beginning to get a bit on the hot side. Tim managed to pop a tyre off due to running low pressures and the size of the ruts now forming on the hill exiting from the bomb hole.





What a delight it was to see Mr. Heather with his series and my oh my, was that thing awesome. I don't think rob stopped grinning all the time he was driving – as for the passengers, perhaps they thought they were in with a mad man and didn't know whether to laugh or cry.





Fortunately, there were no immediate requirements for Hammonds Recovery although several of our members had trouble getting home. The alternator theme continued, overheating and fan belts snapping – I don't think I've known a show to kill so many cars.

Day 2 didn't seem to have the rush but did have a steady flow throughout the day, right through to closing time. A total of 233 rides with £2734 raised pre-expenses.

The clean up

Once home, a competition ensued over the WhatsApp chat to determine who had the dirtiest car and who had the biggest pile of mud. Luke's discovery had managed to have a completely clean back but sides absolutely caked in mud.









Next on list was the see saw and a pressure wash of the framework, the underside and all the ram was on the job list for the Friday (a 50m hose and a cordless pressure washer were just the ticket), followed by subsequent removal from the trailer (it was stuck with mud) to then allow a clean-up of Terry's trailer before return (we'd have been in trouble otherwise me thinks).

Then to get the mud out of the grates – Ralph and Mark might still be there!



Summary

Another very successful but hugely challenging show weekend raising a grand total of £4,578 for our chosen charities' pre-expenses.



 - What is their charitable status? Are they a registered charity (some 'charities'
 with a small annual turnover have no registration, i.e. Bike Active, whom the
 Club supported some years ago)
 - What proportion of their income is for work at the 'coal face' and what proportion is to support administration?
- Making contact.
 - Establish personal contact and introduce SLROC, describe who and what we are and how we go about raising money for charity.
 - Ask them how they would spend a donation of a few thousand pounds.
 - o Could / would they support us by attending the shows with us and getting involved?
 - Have they any similar experience?
 - Do they see their involvement as a benefit and how would they hope to gain from it?
 - Provide expected show and presentation dates.
- Review
 - The responses are collated for a review by the Committee.
 - The Committee review the information and raise questions as deemed fit. This may involve getting back to the charity for clarification.
- The decision
 - o The Committee vote and agree the chosen charities.
 - At Mince Pie Driving Day, the chosen charities for the following year are announced
 - Charity notice in January Nooze.
